Hey, I just wanted to put my two cents in about the elk because I'm worried about my own safety/safety for others. I work two outdoor jobs within the city, but my main job is a graveyard security shift. I've grown up around the elk and seen them expand throughout the years, but I've also dealt with them for multiple years being apart of the GGL team, they've always been a pain in the ass to some extent. I've gotten charged a couple times while trying to herd them away from golfers. And of course the countless nights of running into them while trying to lay down the flags. But within the nearly six years I've been there, I never felt too horrible nervous around them (mostly because I can clearly see them and understand what they're trying to do). But with this graveyard shift, I feel like I'm completely on edge and unsafe every night. I have to do checks for each individual property and it extends all the way down to the beach. It gets pretty dark most nights and their isn't much ligh

ting around, throw some pretty tight, blind corner areas as well that get pretty freaky if an elk is sitting there. And they're surprisingly quiet animals so mixing in how loud the ocean can be it's nearly impossible to hear them most nights. We aren't giving anything to protect ourselves if the worst situation was to happen besides a flashlight. I've always been concerned about them injuring somebody, or even killing some clueless tourist or elderly person who can't defend themselves or run. But now I'm worried for myself about being in the wrong place at the wrong time and getting hurt, or worse just because I'm doing my job. I completely understand that they're beautiful creatures, but it's different seeing just a couple versus 50+.

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

Source: Oregon initial unemployment claims filed from March 15 - April 18, 2020 and Local Area Unemployment Statistics Program first quarter 2020 employment average.


- Northwest Oregon had nearly 13,000 processed unemployment insurance initial claims from March 15 to April 18, greater than the total claims for all of 2019 (10,204).
- There were 103,020 nonfarm payroll jobs in Northwest Oregon in March. Average employment was 119,669 for Northwest Oregon residents in the first quarter of 2020.
- The peak number of unemployed in Northwest Oregon during the Great Recession was 13,135 (11.7% unemployment rate in May 2009).

COVID-19 Business News from Northwest Oregon

- Burgerville will furlough 1,020 of its 1,482 employees due to COVID-19. The move affects all of its store locations in Oregon and southwest Washington.
- Next Adventure, an outdoors company, closed its distribution center and stores in Portland, Sandy, and Warren due to COVID-19.
- Chinook Winds Casino Resort in Lincoln City closed due to COVID-19.
- Walmart plans to hire more than 1,200 associates in Oregon to work in stores, clubs, distribution centers, and fulfillment centers due to COVID-19. The hiring will take place through the end of May.
- Tillamook Country Smoker, a maker of beef jerky, meat sticks, and smoked sausage, is hiring at its facilities in Bay City and Beaverton due to COVID-19.
- McMenamins hotel and brewpub chain will temporarily lay off 3,000 workers and close most locations around the region due to COVID-19.
- Columbia Memorial Hospital in Astoria will layoff about 90 staff who are not involved in direct patient care due to COVID-19.
- Hampton Lumber closed two of its nine mills due to COVID-19 and will continue to evaluate the others on a week-to-week basis. It has facilities in Warrenton, Tillamook, Banks, and Willamina.
- **EO Media Group**, the parent company of the East Oregonian and 12 other newspapers across Oregon, laid off 47 employees due to COVID-19.
