Subject - Ordinances/Resolutions - Resolution 954: Supporting DOGAMI Resilience Efforts in Gearhart

Synopsis: Per the attached correspondence, City staff was notified that Oregon Governor Kate Brown's Budget draft for the Oregon Legislature seeks to dismantle the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) and merge it with both the Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) and the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). DOGAMI is currently the premier geology department of the western United States. Recognizing its importance, a movement has surfaced to "save DOGAMI" through various forms of feedback including a petition, emails, and governmental agencies passing resolutions, (See Tillamook and Clatsop County Board of Commissioner Resolutions, also attached.)

Council Options:

- 1) Resolve to sign the attached Resolution #954;
- 2) Make changes and motion to sign as amended;
- 3) Do nothing.

Recommendation: Staff recommends the Council sign the resolution. DOGAMI has been instrumental in Gearhart's resiliency efforts and a fantastic source of information for numerous safety hazards unique to our area.



- DOGAMI has produced a series of detailed tsunami inundation maps which inform tsunami evacuation planning on the coast. The maps are widely used by residents and visitors alike.
- 3. DOGAMI uses LIDAR mapping of coastal communities to provide geologic detail and historical record of past tsunamis to direct tsunami evacuation planning.
- 4. DOGAMI completed a series of Beat the Wave maps which indicate how long evacuation from sea level communities will take, given predicted failure of bridges and roads, etc. in a seismic event. Beat the Wave maps will help local, state, and federal governments prioritize infrastructure investments to save lives.
- 5. DOGAMI recently completed LIDAR landslide mapping on the Tillamook coast, which will inform disaster preparedness and planning efforts.
- 6. DOGAMI was instrumental in helping the Emergency Volunteer Corps of Nehalem Bay (EVCNB) get started with technical and financial assistance and educational outreach. EVCNB is now a recognized leader in community preparedness.
- 7. DOGAMI has worked with coastal communities in Tillamook County to plan and execute tsunami evacuation routes and signage.
- 8. DOGAMI has influenced the lodging industry to incorporate emergency preparedness planning for tourists and visitors to the coast.

Through educational outreach, community support and scientific data, DOGAMI 9. has raised the earthquake and tsunami awareness of Tillamook coast residents and business owners and fostered a culture of preparedness.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that:

10. The Tillamook County Board of Commissioners proclaims DOGAMI essential to coastal resilience, emergency, and disaster preparedness. Further, the Tillamook Board of County Commissioners supports DOGAMI and asks that DOGAMI be fully funded and empowered to continue its vital work on the Oregon coast.
